Words to know:

Baleen Some whales have teeth, others have Baleen. Baleen is the fringed plates that hang from the upper jaw of baleen whales and strain plankton from the water.

Blowhole An opening for breathing, located on the top of the head of whales and dolphins.

Mammel Whales swim like fish, but they are mammels, just like humans. They use lungs to breath air, have hair on their skin, and whale mothers produce milk for their babies.


Migrate To change location periodically, especially by moving seasonally from one region to another.



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Whale Spout Shapes

Caterina and Leo live near the coast in southern California. Whales swim in California's waters all year long. Humpback, Blue, Fin and Gray Whales are common. Often it is just the whale's spout, a spray of water and mist blown from it's blowhole, that we see above water. Each type of whale has a distictly shaped spout. Can you draw a line from the whale's spout to it's shape?




Gray Whale Migration

During the migration season 25,000 California gray whales migrate (travel) from cool Alaskan waters south along the coast to Baja, Mexico and back. Along the way they swim within 2.5 miles of shore. If you are lucky, one may pass by when you are looking.



Help TheWhale Find His Feeding Grounds

Gray whales spend their summers feeding in the abundant waters off Alaska. But first they must swim there. Help this whale migrate to the her feeding grounds.



How do Baleen Whales Eat?

Whales are not a fish, they are mammals and belongs to a group of marine animals called cetaceans. There are two types of cetaceans: those that have teeth and those that have baleen instead of teeth. All baleen whales have hundreds of pieces of baleen hanging from their upper jaw. Each piece of baleen is called a plate and is made out of keratin, the same material that human fingernails are made of. It is hard but it can also bend. Baleen whales eat tiny animals called zooplankton. They gulp in huge mouthfuls of water and the baleen plates in thier mouths sift the tiny food out of the water.

Activity: Feeding with Baleen

OBJECTIVES:

· Understand how Baleen whales capture their food.

YOU WILL NEED:

1 Aluminum pan
Small plastic, toothed combs
Paper towels
Water
Newspaper
1 About 2 tablespoons of dried herbs




PROCEEDURE:

- 1. Fill the pan with 1-2 inches of water. This is your ocean.
- 2. Your comb is your baleen. The teeth in the comb represent individual plates of baleen. The dried herbs represend tiny zooplankten that your whale is going to eat. Slowly sprinkle the herbs over the surface of the water.
- 3. Move the comb through the water just like a Baleen whale does in search of food. Make long passes across the surface of the water. See how many krill you can capture.
- 4. Wipe the herbs that you have captured onto the newspaper or a paper towel. Pretend the whale has just digested the zooplankton found on the comb. Keep feeding until all the krill (herbs) are gone.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. How did your baleen (comb) help you to catch its food?
- 2. How is the whale's mouth designed to help it catch and eat the largest amount of food?
- 5. How is the whale's mouth different from yours?
- 6. Did you notice that some of the herbs sank to the bottom of the pan? How would a whale catch food near the bottom of the ocean?


Caterina and the Best Beach Day
